The golf tournament was very well run and the boys thoroughly enjoyed themselves

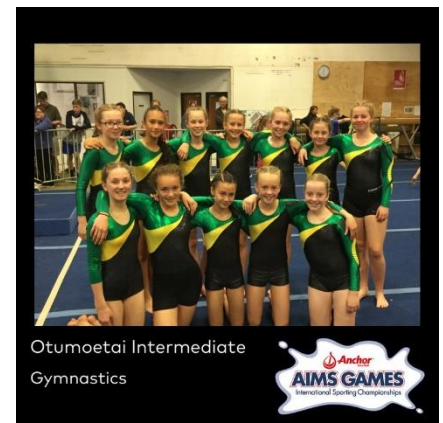

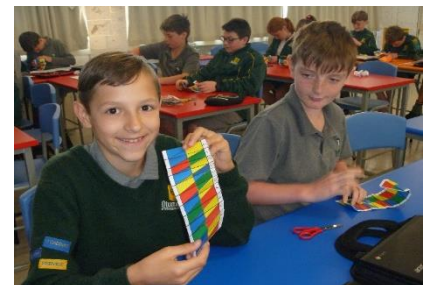
RUTHERFORD SCIENCE

The Year 7 and 8 Rutherford Science students have had an introduction to genetics this term. The subject is quite involved and they are enjoying learning a lot of new scientific words. Adenine, Thymine, Guanine and Cytosine, the four bases, are rolling off their tongues now. They are predicting the ratios of offspring with certain inherited traits by using Punnett squares and showing certain genotypes to explain the features or phenotypes. It is very satisfying watching brown haired, brown eyed students work out how they got blonde haired and blue eyed siblings.

Everyone had a chance to check out if they were tasters or non-tasters using PTC paper. This can give a bitter taste, so, with the loud exclamations of 'yuck!' and groaning; it was quite easy to see who could taste and who couldn't.

Another hands on task was DNA origami. We got great results and everyone had fun making their double helix DNA model. Towards the end of the term, we will research recently extinct species, such as Benjamin, Tasmania's thylacine in 1936 and we will discuss de-extinction or resurrection biology.

This genetics unit will link in nicely to next terms Forensic Science study.



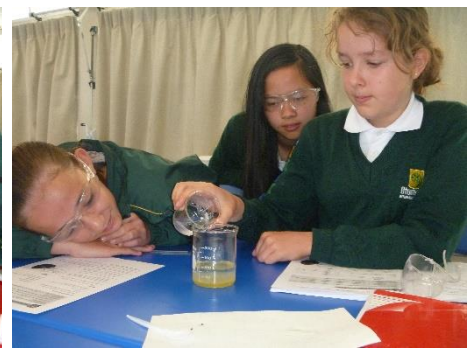
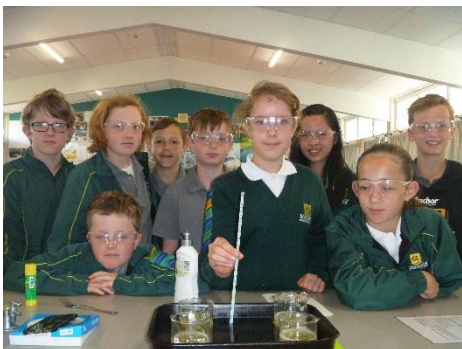

During Term Three, our Rutherford Science class has been learning about genetics; Punnett squares that help you to work out the probability of different traits in offspring, creating 2D and 3D DNA models and describing the organisation of life at a cellular level.

On Friday 14th September, while most of the class were at AIMS Games, nine of us carried out an amazing experiment, extracting DNA from kiwi fruit. We started off by peeling, chopping and blending our kiwi fruit. Then we mixed together 100ml of water, 2 grams of salt and 5 grams of dishwashing liquid; this was the extraction buffer. We then added this to the mashed fruit and sat the mixture in a water bath at 60°C for 15 minutes. Very slowly, we then added 100 mls of iso-Propylalcohol. As we did this, we observed a whitish jelly like substance forming between the fruit and alcohol layers. This was the DNA clumping!

It was a really fun experience and made us feel like real scientists.

When the contributing primary schools arrived, our group was shown through to the hall and we took up our reserved front row seats. It was the Year 9 assembly so the college students all filed in and we waited. Due to heavy rain and traffic the Prime Minister was delayed – but when she did arrive she was met with the most amazing performance by Otumoetai College students. This item showcased a combination of Kapa Haka, along with the Symphonic Band and a contemporary dance troop merging as one. It was outstanding. A lot of our past students were there, very proudly representing their school. Ashton Blair and Mia Gardiner were the emcees and did an incredible job. They presented the Prime Minister with a beautiful pink cardigan for baby Neve, embroidered with the school emblem and a school enrolment pack. Ms Ardern spoke about her own school days and how she used to debate against teams from this area. She recounted a time when she sat her School Certificate English exam and didn't finish it, she was devastated. She used this story to remind students that although it is really important to study and work hard, it is important not to stress too much and be hard on yourself. Ms Ardern then went on to talk about the important elements around education. For her, she said in the number one place are teachers. She spoke how much she values teachers and how she remembers the teachers who inspired her. She did apologise when, she said, "PEteachers not so much – nothing personal but only due to her lack of co-ordination!"

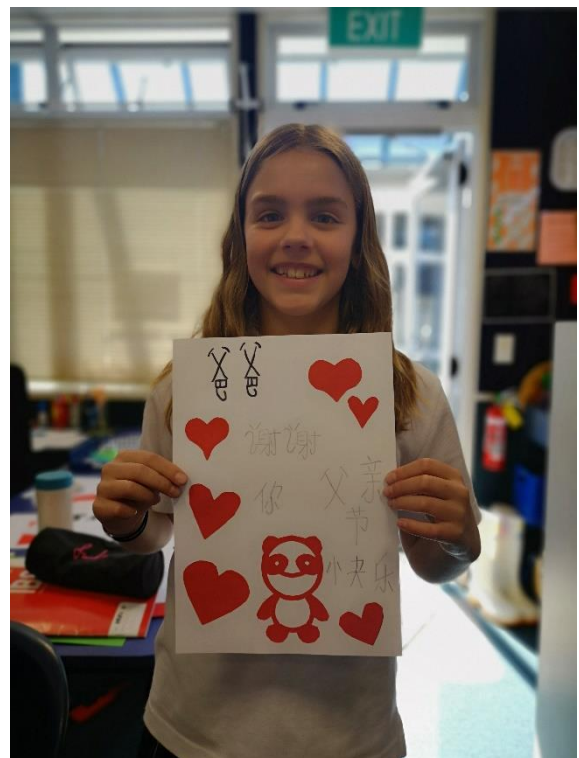

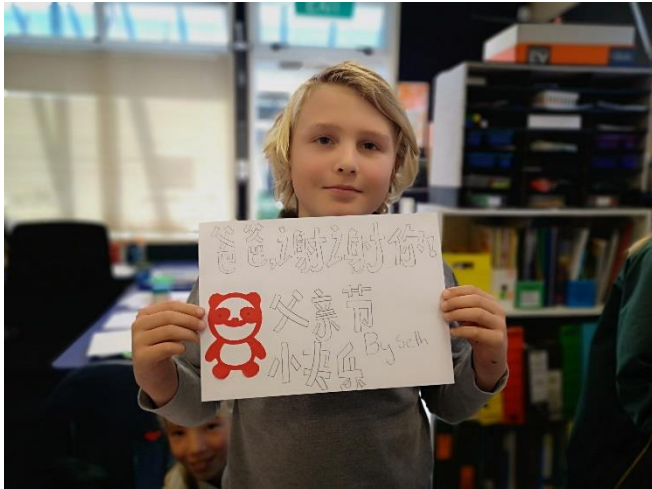
