Emphasis will continue on encouragement, positive attitudes and consideration of others. Manners will be reinforced, particularly in the way students speak to each other and adults. Families are invited to assist us by also focusing on these at home.

Our school is committed to guiding our students towards good citizenship, the development of high levels of interpersonal skills and powerful thinking. This includes enabling all students to use digital technology as an integral part of their learning at our school.

This term our Board of Trustees is wishing to consult with our community to help us establish the direction our school will take over the next five years. Please take the opportunity to participate in this and give us your views.

PARENT AND COMMUNITY CONSULTATION 2018

The Otumoetai Intermediate School Board of Trustees is planning the future direction for our school. This involves consulting widely through meetings and surveys to obtain our community's view of our school and obtain feedback to assist with the development of our key objectives.

At Otumoetai Intermediate School, we have seven strategic goals. We would appreciate your views on these and any suggestions you can make to develop our focus for the future. We are all living in a rapidly changing world and we are determined to ensure your child receives the best year 7 and year 8 education for the 21st century at Otumoetai Intermediate School. It is important for us to understand how our parents feel about the quality of education provided by this school, and more importantly, what we can do better for your child.

Please take the time and opportunity to participate in our consultative process as we value your views.

The Plan:

1. The first stage involves an **informal style café style parent / community meeting** focussing on a SWOT approach. (What are our strengths, weaknesses, what opportunities should we embrace and what are the threats we need to be aware of?)

Participants will be asked to give feedback on the school's perceived strengths, weaknesses, opportunities we should pursue and areas of concern. This will be an opportunity to give feedback in a relaxed informal manner. Supper will be provided. A facilitator who will outline the process and café etiquette for participants will lead the process.

Consultation will be set up around several tables. At each table will be a question / comment that participants will be asked to respond to in writing or images on a large white paper table covering. They could also write on post-its and stick these on relevant sections on the tables. Participants may also prefer to talk to the table host at that table.

Participants then move around and visit each table until they feel satisfied they have contributed.

Each table will have a table host and there will be several roaming café hosts to assist. These will be either specific facilitators, senior leaders or board of trustees members.

Date for this consultation night: Wednesday 30th May, 2018

2. A **consultative survey** will be available at the same time.

This survey will have ten questions seeking parent / caregivers feedback. Parents will be able to either contribute to an **on-line survey monkey** or complete a paper copy with a return addressed envelope. The paper copy will be available for families on request.

The survey will focus on our current seven strategic goals plus values and key competencies. All parents and caregivers will be provided with a **survey link** to the survey through our school links service.

3. A **consultative hui** for whanau will be held to enable our Maori community to provide their views on the school. Parents will be invited to join in an informal korero with supper provided on a drop in basis. Feedback will be recorded on large table coverings by hosts.

Information Collation and Reporting:

All the information provided by our parents, whanau and community will be collated by Mr Rex Allott, an independent consultant. He will work with our Board subcommittee in preparing an analysis for the Board and school community.

UNIFORMS - MOVING INTO WINTER TERM

Students may wear the black winter sports pants as shown in the photograph during Terms 2 and 3. These must be plain, black, straight legged Asic/Brunner style pants with hidden zip on outside bottom legs as shown. They must be made from lined, black, windproof material. Trackpants with stripes or large logos will not be acceptable.

The black sports pants shown in the photograph are available from Active Schoolwear in Grey Street and New Zealand Uniforms. Just like other top schools with a uniform, it is important to us that our uniform looks smart at all times. We have gone through a careful process of quality control and these sports pants have been given approval as Otumoetai Intermediate apparel that will stay in top condition.

Active Schoolwear, NZ Uniforms and The Warehouse are authorised suppliers of our school uniform and if people don't wish to buy these particular sports pants, then they should stay with the regular school uniform. Girls are able to wear black tights with their skirts and scarves in school colours are also acceptable.



We will not accept incorrect jerseys, hoodies, sweatshirts or jackets. We have some donated jerseys and jackets at school for families who need assistance with these. Please note: Otumoetai College apparel is not acceptable at our school.

The school's footwear requirements are able to be viewed on our website. Parents are reminded plain black leather shoes are recommended for winter. Boots, sports shoes and skate shoes with logos will not be accepted.

Athletics

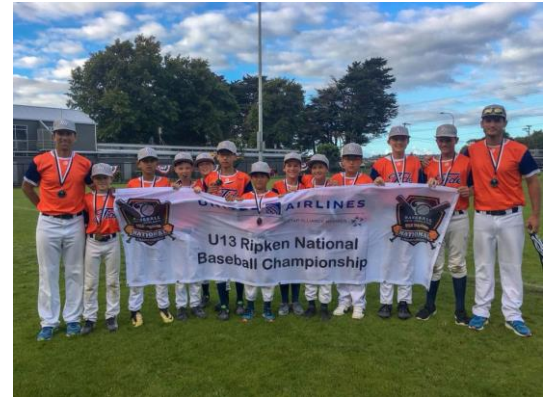
Charlie Sinton competed with the Waikato/Bay of Plenty Rep team and won gold in the 200m and 100m and bronze in the long jump.

ENCOURAGING DEVELOPMENTAL RELATIONSHIPS WITH YOUNG PEOPLE

Healthy developmental relationships happen when young people and adults actively listen to each other; treat each other with respect, honesty, kindness, and empathy; have a shared understanding of their roles and responsibilities within the relationship; respectfully challenge and hold each other accountable; and enjoy their time together. Try these tips for encouraging caring relationships in your child's life.

At Home

- Be emotionally close: No two parents show love in quite the same way. Some shower their children with lots of hugs, high fives, and kind notes; others are more reserved. Tap into your own way of showing your children you care.
- Communicate openly and directly: When you speak to your children, are your messages grounded in love, respect and clarity? Do you ever say one thing and mean another? Or show by your actions you don't really mean what you say?
- Set clear rules. The key to reducing everyone's stress and frustration about rules and expectations is to be clear, consistent, reasonable and open to change. This means being responsive to your child's changing developmental needs and what they've shown you about their choices. Avoid arbitrary decisions that undermine your children's confidence.
- Give children chances to share the work at home and to help out and serve others. Show your children that they are valued at home by giving them increasing levels of responsibility. Then take it a step further by helping them get engaged in service in the community. As always, your good example is the strongest motivator.

In The Community

- Do teachers, coaches and youth leaders like, respect, and treat children fairly? Notice those who make special efforts with your children and thank them. These may include teachers, youth leaders, extended family members, neighbours, music instructors, tutors, bus drivers and many other people in your children's lives. All of them have an influence.
- Encourage the adults you know, respect and trust to spend more time with your children. Offer specific invitations for connections based on mutual interests. Go along too, both to be responsible for your children and to share their learning and experiences.
- Find opportunities for your children to mix with different age groups, especially the elderly. There is much mutual enjoyment in young and old spending time together.

PICKING UP AND DROPPING OFF STUDENTS

Parents and Caregivers become part of the solution

Please pre-plan your pick up and drop off of students at the car park Carlton St reserve off Ngatai Road avoid Charles Street altogether and let your student walk up to the school. The Carlton St reserve off Ngatai Road below the school provides plenty of free vehicle parks and students can walk safely to and from school.

The congestion in Charles Street becomes unsafe and it is important for buses to use this area. It would also leave this small street accessible for parents picking up a student in emergencies.

Please consider a healthier safer alternative of parking and walking.

Safety Concerns in School Carpark

Some mornings before school there are sports training sessions. Consequently, there are often students around our school earlier than normal. All too often we are seeing parents who are clearly in a hurry to drop their child off and get to their own work, who drive into the front carpark at really excessive speeds. They usually then continue with the speed and exit by the recycling and clothes bins towards the college.

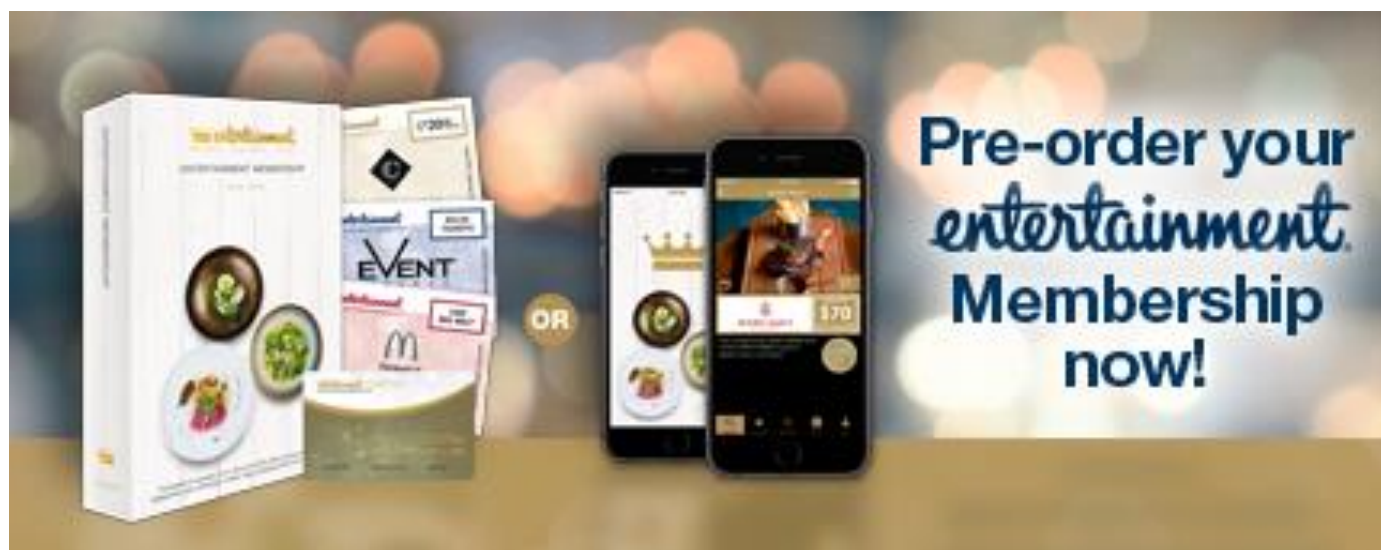
Others drive into the exits at similar speeds. Numerous times, other drivers have had to stop their car, or get out of the way on foot as this happens.
