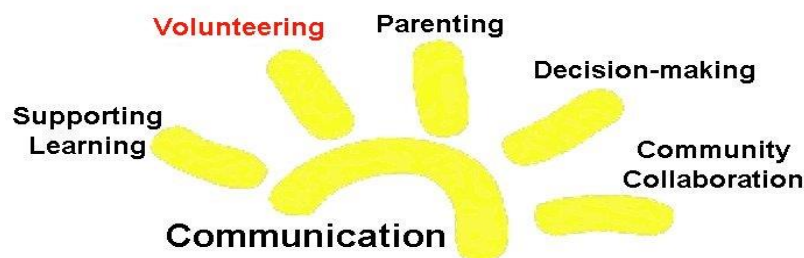

LIONS INTERNATIONAL PEACE POSTER CONTEST

Grace Fellows, a student at Otumoetai Intermediate School art academy has taken the first step to becoming an internationally recognized artist by winning the Lions national contest sponsored by the Otumoetai Lions Club. Her win was recognized with the presentation of the Multiple District Trophy and a certificate at the Otumoetai Lions Club meeting on Tuesday 15th May. Lions Clubs International based in Chicago USA is sponsoring the program to emphasize the importance of world peace to young people everywhere

Grace's poster was among the entries submitted nationally from seven district finalists in the annual Lions International Peace Poster Contest. The seven districts average 45 clubs each and whilst not all clubs enter the competition there was a large number of participants.

In 2017 Otumoetai Intermediate School had over 20 participants with 18 making the final number of competitors under the guidance of teachers Fallon Hughes and Karen Patten. Judging was done by Harry Kiriakidis from Otumoetai Lions with Fallon Hughes and they selected Grace Fellows and Scott Beattie as co-winners. Both had their posters submitted by the Otumoetai Lions to the District final and Grace was declared the winner. Grace's poster was submitted to the Multiple District Convention along with seven others where she was awarded the national winner. The poster was selected for its originality, artistic merit and portrayal of the contest theme. Grace described her poster as **"A girl from different races frees caged doves who are changing the world and making it better for the future. The girl represents everyone and the doves unite us for Peace"**.

Otumoetai Lions Club has a history of actively sponsoring students at Otumoetai Intermediate to develop posters for submission to this contest. Otumoetai Intermediate art academy has been great supporters of such participation and their support has produced 13 previous regional winners in 18 years with a run of seven consecutive winners. Of those 13 Otumoetai Intermediate students, two including Grace, have also won the New Zealand National International Peace Poster contest. Otumoetai Lions Club President Michael Thomson said he was impressed by the expression and creativity of the students at Otumoetai Intermediate. "It is obvious that these young people have strong ideas about what peace means to them. I'm so proud that we were able to provide them with the opportunity to share their visions."

Grace's poster has advanced through to the international levels of competition where she has a chance to be declared the international grand prize winner. One international grand prize winner and 23 merit award winners will be selected. The grand prize includes a cash award of US\$5,000 in NZ dollar equivalent, plus a trip for the winner and two family members to a special award ceremony at the United Nations in New York. The 23 merit award winners will each receive a certificate and a cash award of US\$500 in NZ dollar equivalent. To view past international grand prize winners see www.lionsclubs.org.

Lions Clubs International is the world's largest service club organization with more than 1.35 million members in 210 countries and geographical areas around the world. Since 1917, some hundred years ago, Lions clubs have aided the blind and visually impaired and made a strong commitment to community service and serving youth throughout the world.



INCREDIBLE MINDS – RUTHERFORD YEAR 7 AND 8 SCIENCE

The Hikurangi Subduction Zone - Conferencing with International Scientists on the JOIDES Resolution Science Research Vessel

Last year when I attended a Science Symposium, I had a conversation with Andrea Soanes from Waikato University, who was on the Science Learning Hub stand. She is the Project Manager of the Science Learning Hub. We talked about O.I.S Rutherford Science students and their learning and she asked me if I would like an opportunity to work with the outreach educator for GNS, Aliko Weststrate and scientists on the JOIDES Resolution scientific research vessel the following year. After many e-mails and conversations a satellite connection for a one hour Webinar session was booked through the USA - for the last day of Term one this year.

The first term of this year [and it will be ongoing into Term two], we have been studying Marine Geoscience, initially our focus being the Hikurangi Subduction Zone and slow slip earthquakes. Both Year 7 and 8 students were involved in this. After some Rutherford science lessons, students prepared questions for the scientists. These were typed and e-mailed to Aliko on the JOIDES. She found the appropriate scientists to ask and did some research herself and got the answers for our students. The questions were incredible - I was so proud of the work our students did.

On the day of the Webinar, we set the science room up like an auditorium. With the help of Hadleigh Benson, we downloaded and used the programme ZOOM to match the ship and this also allowed us to record the session for both Aliko and The Science Learning Hub. Much to my relief the connection on the morning was a success.

Aliko talked to the students, showed them maps of where they were drilling for core samples, various photos of the moon pool and other parts of the ship and started answering questions. Aliko has a 10 year old son Josef, who made his mum a LEGO model of the JOIDES. She used this to refer to different areas of the ship. It was a fantastic model and we all clapped. Theo was so taken by the model, being a fellow LEGO fan he made Josef a very cool racing car. We are sending that to Josef. Aliko then took the students on a tour around the ship. She explained and showed us the bow, bridge, life boats, derrick for drilling, and the hospital. She talked about the movie room, gym and ice-cream maker - she was great. She then took us into the Core Lab and introduced us to one of the scientists Damian Saffer – Co-Chief Scientist, from the US. He has been planning this voyage for over 5 years. He explained some things to do with the core lab and showed us some core samples, meanwhile explaining the research scientists do. They will be working on these core samples, providing information for up to five to 10 years once back home.

The ship at the time of the Webinar was on the move as bad weather had forced them to leave the Hikurangi Trough and shelter near Tauranga! They were heading back to Gisborne to continue their work.

Bree McTavish-Huriwai did a great job thanking Aliko on our behalf and our students were very respectful and thankful for the opportunity given to us. During the Webinar they didn't move a muscle for entire hour as they knew this could cause an audio delay. The recording will be edited by staff at the Science Learning Hub and the footage will be used by others.

Later that day, Reuben Timms, Theo McKay, Karlia Taylor, Michelle Clarke- year 8's and Kim Zheng, Will Kirkwood and Anton Brewerton year 7's – were recorded talking about their learning for the Science Learning Hub. Aliki sent an e-mail about the Webinar session and this feedback was shared with the students in class.

"I have done 40 live broadcasts now while on the JR and the group yesterday was by far the most prepared, the most interested and the most knowledgeable about this subject than any other group I have talked to, even under-graduates! Although only 11-13 years old they asked sophisticated scientific questions like, "If the Pacific plate subducts under the Australian plate, where does it all go and is new land created?", and "what is the temperature in the Hikurangi Subduction Zone"?. These show quite advanced critical thinking for their age, and deep content knowledge.

They have learnt a lot of science vocabulary, and a lot about NZ's geological history and future earth science research too. Providing these students the chance to engage with science is so rewarding, and I was delighted to be a small part of this learning journey with them."

We will be reconnecting with GNS Science and the Hikurangi Subduction Zone research team again in the future as they want to share the research that the students saw them collecting on this expedition.

Last term in Rutherford Science, we began to learn about the JOIDES Resolution. It is a research vessel that drills into the ocean floor to collect and study core samples. Ms McPike taught us about sedimentary rock types, natural disasters, and the study of core samples before our webinar session with the JOIDES Resolution. Rutherford science students came up with lots of scientific questions based on our knowledge so far.

The experience with Aliko and Damian was amazing. Aliko showed us on board the ship and the core drilling station. The research they do on board the ship is really fascinating and it makes me interested in being involved in something like that in the future.

During the webinar session I learnt so much from magnetic energy to Zealandia. Not only the facts but to see what goes on in a ship entirely dedicated to science and talking to some of the people, I realised how much work goes into an expedition like this. Also knowing that the scientists I was talking to were finding out information that could potentially save our country and a lot of people's lives, is hard to believe.

Talking to Aliko was awesome because she answered all of our questions and made sure we really understood what she was talking about. Damian showed us the core samples which was intriguing and I feel like the technology these days is evolving rapidly. Overall, it was such an amazing experience and I'm glad I had the opportunity to be a part of it.

TRAVEL SAFE INTERMEDIATE SCHOOLS STUDENT WORKSHOP 2018

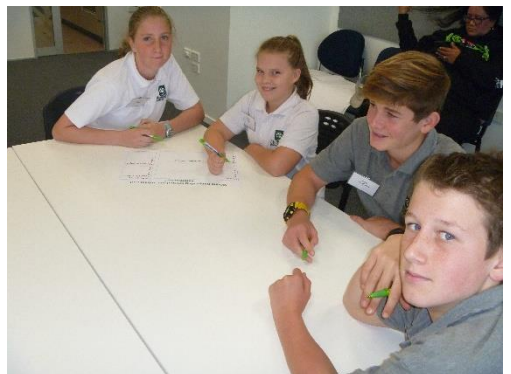
Our Travel Safe Leaders; Rachel Wahab, Holly Scott, Maxwell Rickit and Zane Loughnan attended this workshop on Thursday 3rd May 2018 at the new Tauranga City Council building on Cameron Road. It was a very full half day, working firstly on the Travel Safe School Action Plan. This involved work being done to lift the level of road safety and active transport around schools. The School Action Plan reflects the needs of individual school communities and is ongoing to deal with local issues.



The team then worked on the Bus User Road Safety Programme and did some brain storming around the behaviours of: bus passengers, safe bus drivers, safe motorists and safe pedestrians. Martin Parkes, Transport Manager from Tauranga City Council was a guest speaker and talked to the students about the Council's short, medium and long term plans. The latter looking at 50 years into the future. He spoke about Tauranga being 97% car dependent, how one kilometer of road cost two and half million dollars to build and how future road works will cater for buses, pedestrians and cyclists, hopefully encouraging more people out of cars.



Karen Hay was another guest speaker. She is a Tauranga City Council Traffic and Safety Engineer looking into cycle infrastructure. She discussed the new cycle lane which will help our students in this area. It is scheduled to start construction in September and will go from the Otumoetai Road roundabout, up Ngatai Road finishing at Charles Street.



Our Travel Safe Leaders will be talking to their peers at assembly about this in the future after working with Ros Frost our school Travel Safe coordinator.

PICKING UP AND DROPPING OFF STUDENTS

Parents and Caregivers become part of the solution

Please pre-plan your pick up and drop off of students at the car park Carlton St reserve off Ngatai Road avoid Charles Street altogether and let your student walk up to the school. The Carlton St reserve off Ngatai Road below the school provides plenty of free vehicle parks and students can walk safely to and from school.

The congestion in Charles Street becomes unsafe and it is important for buses to use this area. It would also leave this small street accessible for parents picking up a student in emergencies.

Safety Concerns in School Carpark

Some mornings before school there are sports training sessions. Consequently, there are often students around our school earlier than normal. All too often we are seeing parents who are clearly in a hurry to drop their child off and get to their own work, who drive into the front carpark at really excessive speeds. They usually then continue with the speed and exit by the recycling and clothes bins towards the college.

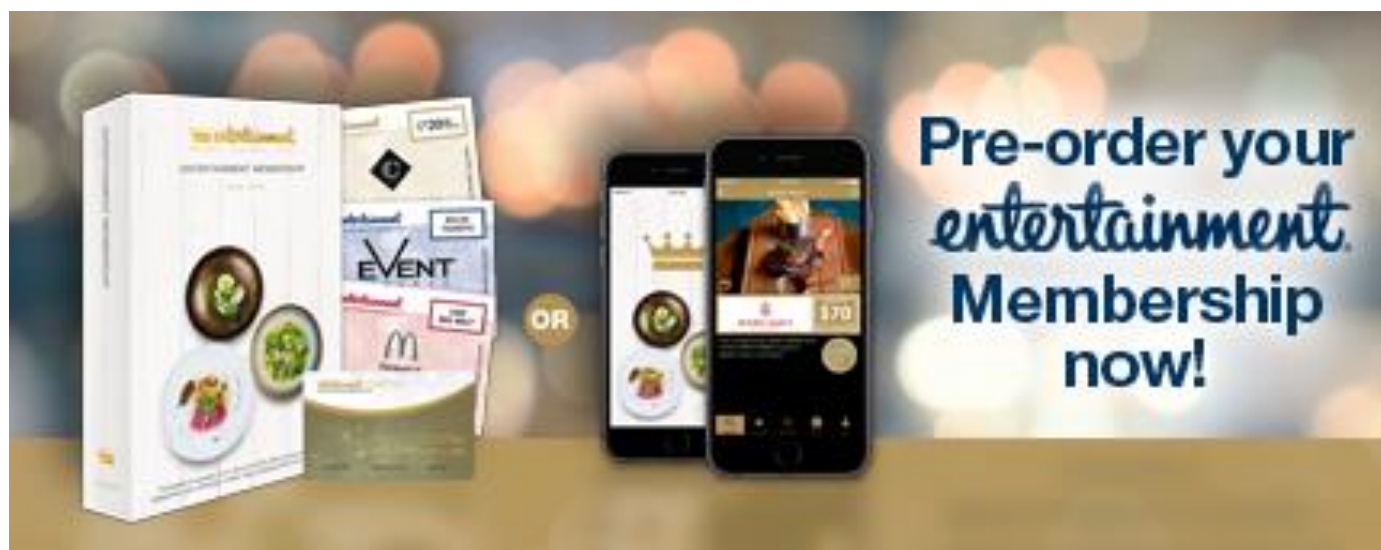
Others drive into the exits at similar speeds. Numerous times, other drivers have had to stop their car, or get out of the way on foot as this happens.
