The school Board of Trustees met on Thursday 21st June, outlined below are some highlights from that meeting:

- The Board were presented with baseline mid-year data in the areas of Reading, Written Language and Mathematics. We were provided with information which showed pleasing academic ability and progress in all key learning areas (Reading, Writing and Mathematics) across both the Year 7 and 8 cohort groups. Students who are tracking below (where they would ideally be expected for their age) are identified by Teachers and Team Leaders, and monitored closely to ensure all opportunities for accelerated learning are realised.
- Parent-Teacher-Student conferences have been held and reports handed out. We hope that you were able to attend these with your child and learn about their understanding of the academic progress they have made to date, as well as the steps they need to put in place moving forward to achieve their learning goals. Thanks to all staff who work tirelessly to prepare for these important interviews; your hard work is sincerely appreciated.
- A special thanks to those parents who came out for the Community Consultation evening last month. Your input was appreciated and comments made will be given careful consideration. Thanks also to those whānau who filled out the Survey Monkey questionnaire online. This generated over 300 responses. We feel reassured that a wide range of views and opinions will be heard as we start our strategic planning for the school.

COMBINED LEADERS CAMP 2018

Last term, 16 service leaders went to the Ngamuwahine combined leadership camp along with Mount Maunganui and Tauranga Intermediate Schools. Prior to the camp, leaders from all schools had to prepare, practice and present a two minute speech. The topic was *"What are the three traits of a good leader that stand out for you? Is there a leader that you can tell us about who exemplifies these qualities?"*

Students were randomly selected at any time of the day or night, to present their speeches to an audience of around 70 people. While listening to the speeches, we all realised how unique every person was and the different walks of life each person came from.

During our time at Ngamuwahine, we participated in a range of activities; from team building, first aid and self-defence to high ropes, public speaking and line dancing. We were challenged both mentally and physically, pushed to our limit, and encouraged to reach our fullest potential.

We can speak on behalf of all our service leaders in saying that we took so much away from this camp and are incredibly thankful for the opportunity to have had this amazing experience.

Here is some of the student feed-back about their challenges:

- I had more confidence with public speaking than I thought I would! It has made me a better person and I have discovered what a true leader is – and how to be one. I have built up lots of self-confidence.
- *Camp was very helpful for me. It taught me how to speak better in front of a crowd. The most helpful thing for me was having my confidence build. Now I can talk very well in front of people. Lots of speeches inspired me. They taught me new things and also things I needed reminding about. One speech was about being different. This gave me confidence about my height – now I am proud of the way I am. It has helped and taught me a lot.*
- I used to feel short on stage doing assembly. Now I feel tall. Thank goodness for our Public Speaking workshop and speeches!
- *The speeches showed me to be confident and not to be shy. I learnt about myself and found I can get a bit bossy and don't always listen to people. Everyone was included.*
- Leader camp completely changed me and it changed my mind-set too. I learnt that people don't judge me as much as I thought and I do have the ability to make new friends. Camp made me so much more confident when speaking in front of people. I feel way more confident in doing assembly now.
- *At camp I learnt how to have a positive attitude towards everything. Also how to cope in difficult situations. I learnt how to socialise with people I have not met before. At camp I learnt what I am like when I work with others, I need to offer more of my own ideas. I learnt how to relax in front of large audiences. I stepped out of my comfort zone. I got to do things I probably wouldn't get the chance to do in my life.*
- Camp also helped me with my confidence. Not just public speaking, but trusting in yourself and your abilities and being confident enough to share your ideas in a group. I learnt that inner strength is key to being successful. If you don't believe in yourself then how are people supposed to believe in you? Overall camp was an amazing learning experience.

- *I learnt that when I present a speech in front of people – no one is against me. They all want me to succeed. This has helped me a lot with my confidence. I now know that some nerves are fine.*
- *Camp was very beneficial – it made me step out of my comfort zone. I was pushed the most in public speaking. The workshop helped me a lot. Having to create and present the speech was a challenge. This has helped me grow and helped my confidence – I know I can do it!*
- *At camp I learnt the importance of having the ability to lead – not just standing up and telling people what to do but listening, taking on others people's advice and ideas and letting them shine. I learnt this incredible skill at camp. At first I looked at others and thought to myself 'why wouldn't they accept other's ideas, and then I realised I was the same!' This is a lifelong skill I will carry with me where ever I go.*
- *At camp, I learnt how to socialise with students I've never met before. I got over my fear of public speaking. I learnt a lot about myself and also that I actually like public speaking, it's just that up until now, I haven't had the opportunity.*
- *Learning at camp is the number one reason you go. What I have taken from this opportunity is priceless. I found out a lot about myself and how I react to situations I hadn't yet experienced. I got out of my comfort zone.*
- *At the start of that work shop we had to introduce ourselves – I found it really hard. At the end we had to do an impromptu speech and I felt more comfortable and projected my voice. I sounded confident even though I was nervous.*
- *... the main thing was discovering the characteristics of a leader and I was inspired to fit those traits.*
- *To be a leader I think I have to know when to step in and when I need to stop and let others have a go. You have to have self-confidence and not doubt yourself. Be humble and treat everyone respectfully and equally.*



TRAVEL SAFE

On Wednesday 27th June the Travel Safe team met at Otumoetai Intermediate, hosting 16 Year 6 Bellevue Primary School students. Together with Roslyn Frost, the Travel Safe Coordinator, and Karen Hay, the Road Safety Engineer, they looked at the Ngatai Road cycle way design plans. The students were allowed to ask Karen questions and make their own suggestions on how they would like to see the cycle way work.

Some suggestions from the Otumoetai Intermediate team were; to run a centre line down the length of the cycle way. This would help keep cyclist to the left and in single file. They suggested solar 'up lighting' to run along the cycle way for dull or rainy days. At the proposed bus stop, they suggested hand rails where the bikes need to stop, so they can balance on their bikes, keeping their feet up, while waiting for pedestrians. At this stop, they suggested a "stop wifi hot spot"! Also looking at the plan, they saw an area that could pose a potential problem. Cyclists needing to exit the Ngatai Road cycle lane, so they can turn up Western Road. Karen will look into this, as it would need a road crossing and part cycle lane into Western Road.

The cycle way is waiting for an independent safety audit and will go for funding approval by the NZTA. Construction is weather dependent, but maybe ready in February for the start of the new school year.

It was a very positive and productive meeting. The Bellevue Primary School students did exceptionally well presenting their findings to the group.

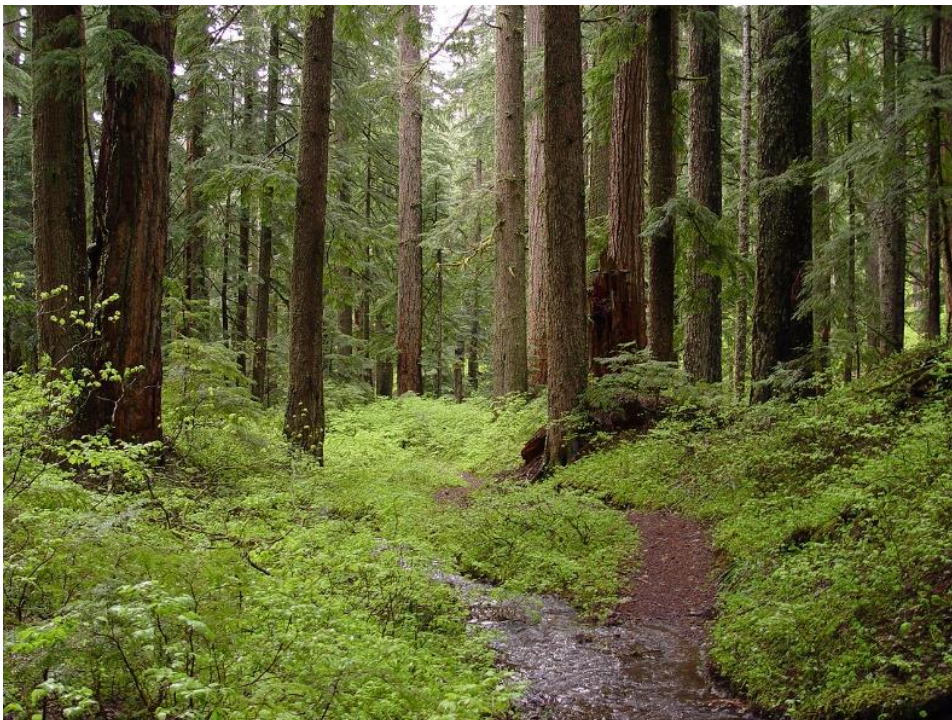

PICKING UP AND DROPPING OFF STUDENTS

Parents and Caregivers become part of the solution

Please pre-plan your pick up and drop off of students at the car park Carlton St reserve off Ngatai Road avoid Charles Street altogether and let your student walk up to the school. The Carlton St reserve off Ngatai Road below the school provides plenty of free vehicle parks and students can walk safely to and from school.

The congestion in Charles Street becomes unsafe and it is important for buses to use this area. It would also leave this small street accessible for parents picking up a student in emergencies.

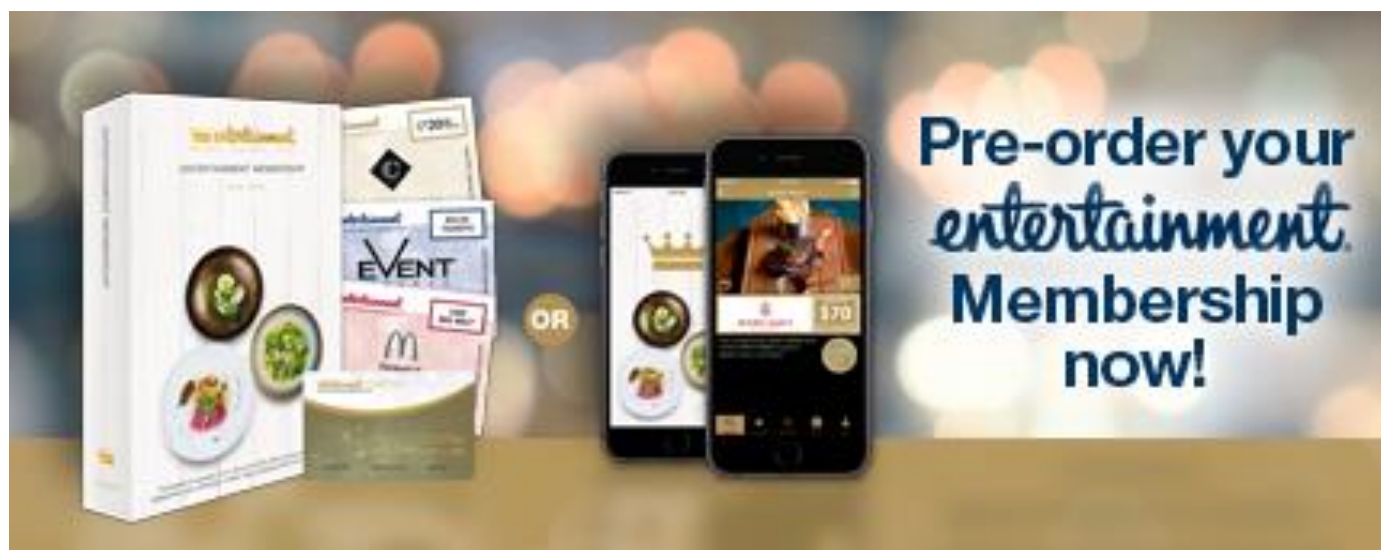
Others drive into the exits at similar speeds. Numerous times, other drivers have had to stop their car, or get out of the way on foot as this happens.
